Circuit Meeting Update 6th December – CMC @ Wigton Road

The meeting was opened with devotions from Cornerstone church offering a reading and the singing of "Spirit of God, unseen as the wind".

Following a conversation at the previous meeting, accident books were distributed. If you church does not have an accident book, please let your minister know and we will obtain further copies.

The meeting agreed a resolution from the Borders Hub for the creation of Borders Methodist Church with Gilsland, Longtown, Wetheral and Brampton having agreed at their respective church councils to create a multi-site church. Although they are planning on working closely over the next nine months, the change will formerly take effect on the 1st September 2024. Further change was reported from the Borders Hub with a vote taking place early this year for a joint mission community (by merging the existing Borders MC, Irthing, Gelt & Eden MC and Eden Wild Goose MC), so covering the area of the Borders hub.

The meeting also agreed to the sale of the Etterby Street manse which requires a significant amount of maintenance work. The CLT were asked to progress the sale to release vital funds for mission and ministry within the circuit. The meeting also noted the progress of the sale of Thursby Chapel.

Another significant item of business included the potential creation of a single Cumbria Circuit. With the North West England District coming into being this September (with James Tebbutt as chair), a proposal is being considered for a single circuit to maintain our Cumbrian identity. A consultation document is now available, please contact the CLT if you would like a copy. The proposal will need to come to church council and then back to the circuit meeting before it is finally taken to synod.



Thanks was given to all those (in the meeting and beyond) who have attended unconscious bias and EDI training. The biblical call to be people of justice means that this is a central part of what it means to be Christian. We are reminded that Jesus does not place any caveats on his call for us to love one another.



Cornerstone

Cornerstone Youth Church did us proud (18th November) when they organised a waiter/waitress service beetle drive and pie & peas supper in Wigton church hall to raise cash for a Tear Fund project known as Toilet Twinning. More than 50 folk had a great night and lovely supper (included cakes and tea/coffee) at the end of which enough cash (which included donations) had been raised to install three toilets (for communal use) in underdeveloped countries where flush toilets are a real luxury. Sadly, there is a long list of countries where sanitation is both shockingly basic and scarce – but by a ballot among worshippers at morning service (on 26th November), it was decided to install toilets in Nepal, South Sudan and the Democratic Republic of Congo. A sizeable team pulled out the stops, not least supervisor Claire Jackson (wife of Rev Phil) and MC Adrian Cozens.

Cornerstone's new Children and Families Worker Mrs Jennie Crawley is making new friends and building strong bonds of outreach since her arrival. There's a sizeable bag of ideas being put into programme but mum-of-two Jennie got a taste of how responsive the local community can be with a 'Light Party' at Wigton Church (29th October). Lots of helpers and donors responded and around 60 parents/carers and children had a whale of a time (dressing up, pumpkin carving, treasure hunting, maze exploration and the rest). And two sessions of crafting launched a travelling nativity sets initiative which was a success at the Wigton church's 'Messy Lite' event (26th November, Wigton lights switch-on).

A touching contribution was made to Wigton morning service on 12th November with a reading from his wheelchair (and with wife Julie by his side) from Steve Harding who has been slowly re-building his life after suffering a stroke. Steve, a former major in the Royal Army Medical Corps, was under training as a Circuit Local Preacher, when his life was turned upside down a little over 18 months ago. But he's letting it be known that he has work to do for Cornerstone and that he's back!

There was a pleasing response to the annual Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Appeal. At the dedication service (5th November), 62 shoeboxes , filled with Christmas gifts for less privileged children overseas, were blessed by Betty Jagger before onward transportation by the charity Samaritan's Purse. In addition, a total of £268 was collected for the same cause. Three weeks later, Rev Phil Jackson blessed and dedicated new toys to be gifted to local children...another

top response to an appeal put out by Alan and Adeline Fearon who were confident of hitting their target of 100 toys.

Remembrance Sunday (12th November) was marked at morning services at Wigton (leader Nathan Pattinson) and at Aspatria (leader Robert Pattinson with valuable input from Abigail Hartshorne-Bell and Jennifer Reay) to remember and honour the memories of those who fought for our freedom and those who continue to defend it. As our images portray, the ladies at Aspatria know how to make a salute with colour and creative thought.

The Cornerstone Gift Day appeal in October added a marvellous £6,330 (from all sources) to church funds. A timely prompt had been given earlier with the cautionary news that in the year ended $31^{\rm st}$ August, 2023, Cornerstone's essential spending exceeded income by £16,238. A 'big ticket' item which couldn't be avoided was the fitting of a new heating boiler in the Wigton church in early October. The supply and installation of the Rehema Quinta Ace 55 came with a bill of £7,500 – but with the promise of splendid service for years to come.

St Mary's Beaumont, St Michael's Burgh and Monkhill Chapel jointly hosted the event and a meal of delicious steak pie and peas followed by a variety of sweet desserts was served. The meal was accompanied by a fun quiz with prizes and the evening proved very enjoyable.

The United Remembrance Day service was held at St Mary's Beaumont followed by our Brunch Service in the schoolroom at Monkhill to enjoy delicious bacon butties and hear some interesting and relevant stories relayed by Alan Fearon.

In November we participated in Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Appeal and the schoolroom was a drop-off point for shoeboxes again. We held a couple of official packing sessions that were advertised locally and a few unofficial ones to deal with all the items donated to go in the boxes. Together with Stoneraise School Shoeboxes (thanks to Annmarie Pattinson of Thurstonfield Chapel), a total of 168 shoeboxes were collected from the schoolroom towards the end of November. This exceeded the number collected last year – amazing! An email just received from Samaritan's Purse who oversee the appeal have notified us that 23,655 shoeboxes have been donated this year; that's over 23,000 children who will hear about Jesus and the hope of the Gospel, perhaps for the first time. We are proud at Monkhill to be able to be a part of this achievement and eagerly await news of our boxes' destination.

Now in Christmas mode, we have held our Christmas Lunch with Us on the first Thursday in December; a traditional Christmas dinner which apparently was "superb". The new heaters in the schoolroom have just been fitted so festive lunchers were able to take full advantage of a warmer place to eat! We are attracting a few new faces as well which is excellent news.

The next lunch reverts back to the usual last Thursday (25th January)

Christmas celebrations continue this week with Carol Singing in The Drovers at Monkhill on Friday 15th at 7.00pm, back this year by popular demand.

On Saturday 16th between 10am and 2pm, a kind invitation has been extended to all within the Solway Hub of Churches to join a gettogether at Cardew Lodge Dalston, following a successful get-together and barbeque in the summer.

The Community Christmas Service for our Parish is taking place at the Parish Hall this Sunday 17th at 10am starting with coffee and mince pies. It will be led by David Newlove and members at Monkhill and St Mary's will be taking part. We hope to be able to send donations again of non-perishable items to the Carlisle Food Bank and toys to children in the Carlisle area who are less fortunate.

The following Tuesday evening 19th at 7.00pm is the Carol Service at Port Carlisle Chapel followed by refreshments.

Monkhill Chapel is not holding further services now until after New Year because most members are away or unable to attend but of course there is opportunity for any others who are able, to support services in the Parish or at other Methodist Churches over the next couple of weeks.

We take this opportunity to wish you all a very happy and peaceful Christmas and New Year.

Hosting Political Events.

With the Government's commitment to a General Election coming in this year it is appropriate to remind churches of how we handle requests for the use of our premises for political meetings.

Our Standing Orders (921) remind us that Managing trustees are not permitted to sponsor meetings of political parties, nor may such meetings be held in the name of any Methodist body.

We can allow political parties to hire our buildings for their occasional use (eg as prospective candidate wishing to host a meeting in their name). This must be a separate event to anything we run. Please note that the submission of resolutions or taking of votes on political matters is not allowed during any Methodist meeting for public religious worship nor whilst congregations are assembled or dispersed.

It is also the case that no signatures for petitions on political matters may be invited during any Methodist meeting for public religious worship without the consent of the Church Council.

What we can do is sponsor an event that promotes informed discussion of public issues in the context of Christian theology and ethics and we are able to host a hustings for prospective candidates to attend but as a rule for this and all of the above we only accept such requests from a candidate whose party they represent currently has a sitting MP in the Houses of Parliament.
